My dear people

There are different models of understanding the meaning of the death of Jesus. First is that it is an act of ransom or payment to God by which Jesus brought the world freedom from evil and death. Then there is another view that the death of Jesus as a sacrifice offered to God. A third view is an understanding that his death as a deed that shows the depth of God's love for all of us. Today's Gospel offers yet another model for understanding Jesus' death.

Passover is approaching and many pilgrims have come to Jerusalem for the great festival that commemorates the liberating power of God in the Exodus. Our Gospel begins with the arrival of some Greeks. They are Greek speaking Gentiles who are interested in Judaism and they too are on their way for the Passover festival and they want to see Jesus. Their request adds a new era in the ministry of Jesus as Jesus' followers go beyond that of the Jewish people to include Gentiles.

The rest of the Gospel story is about Jesus' own

interpretation of his death. He uses two images.

Firstly, the image of a seed. The main point to understand what Jesus says is found in the difference between the seed 'which remains a single seed' and the seed that 'bears much fruit' in dying. Jesus tells the people that his death will be fruitful because it will give life to a big community of believers which will be gathered in his name.

The second image is that of the 'hour.' the Gospel of John uses the word 'hour' to describe the agony and death of Jesus. Jesus will embrace that hour in his love for the Father, who now speaks and those who were present were not sure what they heard. For some it was like a clap of thunder and for others it was a voice of an angel as signs of God's presence.

The crowd knows God has revealed something but failed to recognise the very presence of God in Jesus.

Fifth Sunday of Lent (Year B)

Scripture Insights



Our parish is celebrating the third scrutiny for candidates seeking Full Communion into the Church at the 11.30am Mass.

Scripture Insights: Year A

Today's short reading from Ezekiel is the conclusion of one of the best-known oracles in this prophetic book. The fuller text, commonly referred to as "the dry bones," is an oracle of salvation that speaks of a time in the near future, when exiled Israel will be brought back to life and return to Judah. The metaphor of bodily resurrection is most appropriate at this time in the liturgical year.

The responsorial psalm for today is another of the seven penitential psalms. The refrain for this lament, "With the Lord there is mercy and fullness of redemption," stems from the personal experience of the psalmist.

In Paul's Letter to the Romans, he contrasts two ways of living, "in the flesh" and "in the Spirit." For Paul, life in the flesh refers to human life with all its weaknesses, whereas life in the Spirit refers to life that is focused on God and God's ways. Paul reminds us that, indeed, the Spirit of God dwells within us. In the Gospel account of Lazarus being raised from the dead, Jesus waits several days before going to his

ill friend. When Jesus appears, he tells Martha that her brother will rise, allowing her to profess her belief in the resurrection on the last day. When Jesus states that he is the resurrection and the life, allowing her to profess her belief in the resurrection on the last day. When Jesus states that he is the resurrection and the life, Martha again professes her belief in Jesus. Martha's faith in Jesus does not require that he perform miraculous deeds, whereas many of the people who had come to be with Martha and Mary believed in Jesus only after they had seen the great deeds he had performed.

Reflections

· Morality, resurrection, despair, belief: Today's Gospel reading offers so many themes to explore. Imagine what seemingly impossible new life God wants for us to take hold of as we profess our faith. Consider each of the key players in this family: Mary, the one who sits at Jesus' feet when he visits; Martha, the one who questions Jesus, who is always busy in her work caring for home and family, who does not fear raising her concerns to God; Lazarus, deathly ill, beloved friend of Jesus. Each of these personalities has a place in God's story. Each of them comes to Jesus and Jesus meets them just as they are, with no requirement to first be perfect. These are the ones whom Jesus loves, varied in their experience and personhood, imperfect though beloved—just like each of us. Where has Jesus found you on your journey?
